




Drama Showcase 2018

Women in Engineering

A group of 6 Year 8 and Year 9 girls took part in the annual Women in Engineering competition held at Amey PLC on Friday, 25th May 2018. This was one of the regional heats of the competition where four schools were taking part and each team was accompanied by employees of Amey for guidance and keeping on track throughout the day.

The students were tasked to design and construct a model bridge to replace a real life collapsed bridge. They were briefed about the types of bridges, their pros and cons and the external factors to consider before they started. After deciding on which bridge to construct as a team, the girls assigned roles and tasks amongst themselves based on everyone's strengths. Aliza was unanimously voted in as the Project Manager. They had to design the bridge, work out how much building equipment of each type they will need, the cost attached, the time scale they had to complete each task within a Gantt chart, risk assessment, the environmental constraints and finally build the model and present it in front of the judges and audience. They completed the various components for submission deadlines throughout the day.

The team worked cohesively, making up for each other's slip-ups, playing on their strengths and delivering an impressive end product. At the end of the day, the team presented their project to the judges. The girls were confident and professional and although they didn't win, they were quite rightfully told that their presentation was the best of the day. The group represented the school very well as a whole.



Isle of Wight 2018 Travel and Tourism

On 13th of June, Year 10 Travel and Tourism students went on the Isle of Wight residential trip as part of our coursework which is all based around customer service. The Isle of Wight is a small island located just off England's south coast. It is commonly known for its dinosaur fossil remains and the beaches.

We took a coach from Birmingham to Southampton which roughly took two and a half hours, we then travelled on a Red Funnel Ferry. While on the ferry, one of the managers of the Red Funnel company gave us detailed information on the company and we asked some pre-prepared questions to use in our coursework. On the last day, we went to the Donkey Sanctuary where we got a tour of the attraction and got a chance to ask our questions which will later be used in our coursework. We then returned to Birmingham via ferry and coach.


Languages Fair – Year 6

Visiting Dippy The Dinosaur By Harpreet Mangat

On Thursday 14th June, members of Year 7 Journal Group and Year 8 Advanced English Group embarked on a journey back in time; precisely 65 million years ago, to the age of the dinosaurs, the largest animals to roam the earth. As a reward for a year of hard work, we had the opportunity to visit Birmingham Museum, which currently houses the skeleton of a very popular diplodocus, fittingly named Dippy the Dinosaur. Over 12 tons in weight and 27 metres in length, Dippy was truly the biggest attraction there. Originally held in the central entrance hall of the Natural History Museum in London, the museum curators felt it was time for a new attraction to greet visitors and sent Dippy on a national tour before having him relocated to the gardens that surround the museum. Ten different venues will be hosting Dippy for several months.

We arrived at Birmingham Museum at around 10am in the school minibus. Our slot to see Dippy was at 11am, so we had time to look around some of the exhibits the museum had to offer. The first room we encountered had large, detailed, grand paintings strewn across its rosy red walls. There were several rooms around the museum decorated like this.
